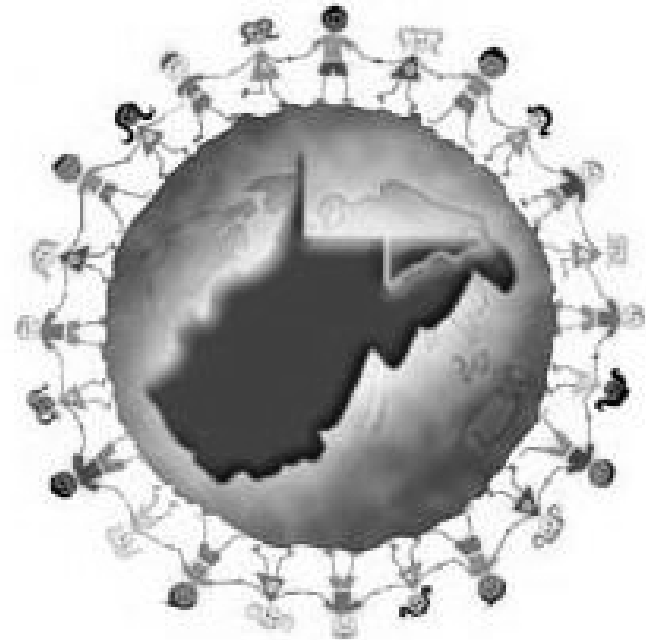

### Monetary Gifts to the Missions for credit

- *Prior to* March 31—Monetary gifts (from your local church) may be sent to the Conference Treasurer office in Charleston as they are generated throughout the year
- *After* March 31—Monetary gifts must be checked in at the COME site the day of the event

### Undesignated Gifts shall be distributed using this formula:

- ✓ \$2000 deducted for administrative costs.

- ✓ The sum of all Church and Community Ministries shall be considered one project.

Heart and Hand Ministries, located in Barbour County, sponsors several programs that assist residents maintain economic stability and independence. Our farm market is expanding to being a hub for small farm growth with an emphasis on locally grown produce for the home and restaurant industry. The program is expanding with support from USDA and other partners. Currently, there are 75 growers participating in the program. Another outreach ministry we coordinate is the new home and home repair program. We have built new homes each year since 1998 that are provided to qualified families. We also continue to repair close to 30 homes per year utilizing teams of church volunteers from across the United States. Our ministry with youth has resulted in two major projects. One is an after school tutoring/skill development program underwritten by the Department of Juvenile Justice. The other is our Christmas Toy Store distribution which gives parents and care-givers an opportunity to select appropriate toys for children. Our newborn layette project provides a starter kit of diapers, sleepers, bottles, and other necessary items for a baby. We also include a bible as spiritual encouragement, too. We continue to provide support to those requesting food, clothing, utility and rental assistance. This is a basic component of our outreach ministry and resources need to be replenished constantly due to the enormous demand.

### **NEEDS LIST:**

Layette: disposable diapers, crib linens, receiving blankets, powder, lotion, shampoo

Kid's Items: toys and games, car seats, school supplies

The House of the Carpenter, Inc, located in Wheeling, provides emergency services for people who are hungry, poor, disadvantaged, oppressed, hurt, abused, exploited or disabled. The House of the Carpenter develops long-range programs to address root causes of poverty, as well as to meet the needs regarding health, education and protection of human rights.

The House of the Carpenter Offers:

- ✓ Food Pantry – now feeding 850 families monthly
- ✓ Clothing Center – sees approximately 200 people each day
- ✓ Emergency assistance – aid with utilities, rent, medical prescriptions, transportation, furniture, Christmas gifts
- ✓ Summer resident camping program
- ✓ Wheeling Health Right Inc. – a free walk-in clinic operating at four sites with an active case load exceeding 15,000 people
- ✓ Project CAPE – breaking the cycle of poverty by helping mothers/fathers to finish their education while their children are attending Head Start
- ✓ Coalition for the Homeless addressing needs of the homeless
- ✓ Home repair program for seniors and persons with handicapped conditions.

Scott's Run Settlement House has been a place to turn to for Christian care of individual, family, and community needs since 1922. It has a variety of ministries that meet the needs of the people of western Monongalia County, a rural poverty pocket.

In the Bluefield Parish, Kathleen is assigned to lead the Parish in outreach ministries to children and families. Her focal point is the Mary's Cradle ministries. By means of direct services and systemic change, Mary's Cradle Maternal and Infant Resource Center seeks to respond to the needs of pregnant women, new mothers, and their families, especially those "at risk." Areas of particular emphasis are low birth weight babies and other special needs infants, young children and their families. Educational opportunities are offered to parents in cooperation with other community agencies. Special assistance for teen-age moms is a priority. All services are free to those who present a need.

The Greater Clarksburg Cooperative Parish consists of 22 United Methodist Congregations located across the communities of Clarksburg and Bridgeport in north central West Virginia. The people of the parish serve God and their neighbors through a variety of outreach ministries such as the 2 food pantries, serving the physical needs of low and fixed income families.

“Open Heart Ministries,” a shared outreach ministry of the cooperative provides emergency funds to assist families in crisis with utility, heat and rent bills.

In addition, the cooperative parish conducts a yearly leadership training event, sponsors parish-wide youth ministries/activities, Booth Festival, worship services and a parish picnic.
